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## WE PRESENT...

We, the yearbook staffs of nine United States Air Force high schools overseas, present this, our third edition of VAPOR TRAILS. We have combined our efforts to form not only a yearbook and a treasury of memories but also, figuratively speaking, a guided tour through the six countries and three continents - Europe, Asia, and Africa - on which our schools are located. In each of the nine sections of our book we show our school days in the host country which many of us have known as home for three years or more. You, as you turn these pages, will see that no matter whether palm or plane trees, gilded domes or thatched cottages comprise a part of each school's background, the pupils of all nine are united by attending American schools outside their native land.

Our pictures, stories, and art work of classroom scenes and school events emphasize the similarity of our lives with those of our counterparts in the United States. We study English, French, algebra, and chemistry; we learn world geography, history, and American government; we try-out for plays, teams, and cheerleading; we join clubs, sing in choruses, help with carnivals, laugh with the freshmen during initiation week, and dance at parties and the junior-senior proms; and we wait breathlessly for class rings, yearbooks, and graduation day. These and many other activities we share with high school pupils from Maine to California.

Similar as our school life is to that in the United States, however, our living in a foreign country holds added interests. Our outlook broadens and
our understanding of other peoples increases through our knowledge of their histories, languages, customs, and laws. Geography means more when the English Channel, the Seine, the Rhine, and the Mediterranean are no longer just names on a map. History becomes a colorful pageant when we explore the Tower of London, an ancient Roman Camp in Germany, a crusaders castle in Turkey, the gardens of Versailles, or the ruins of a once lovely, ancient city in Libya or Morocco. As we become better acquainted overseas, we can help strengthen the bonds of friendship and peace among freedom loving peoples, now while as junior ambassadors we live among our new friends, and in later years when we assume adult responsibilities in the United States.

Skimming through these pages of Vapor Trails in days to come will bring to mind recollections of school days, classroom scenes, and friends overseas. We shall recall the pleasure of making a mercury barometer in the science laboratory, the thrill of cheering for the team, and the excitement of planning a school dance. We shall also remember eating hot, buttered scones beside an English fire, buying trinkets in exotic Eastern bazaars with the sun blazing down upon us, mailing souvenir cards to ourselves and our friends from the tiny post office at the top of the Eiffel Tower, trekking through the Black Forest in Lederhosen, or watching the great black camels swaying along dusty desert roads. Crowded with many memories, our 1959 Vapor Trails is a book to be cherished - always.

## NEW VS. OLD

Just as the city of Ankara is a moving panorama of the new versus the old, so our school has seen many changes in its two years of existence. It has gone a long way from its primitive beginning on September 16, 1957. This has been a memorable year, for it has seen many improvements. The year' $57-58$ was one of hardships and shortages. We were just beginning. We had neither lockers nor heat until December, and no gymnasium. There was no cafeteria until Christmas. When school opened on September 3, 1958, we found many changes. Our lockers had arrived, and heating units were installed. A fine cafeteria was set up and a new gymnasium appeared. Typewriters and sewing machines became realities. Clocks decorated every classroom, and the playground was fenced in. The overall appearance was greatly improved.
Our school became accredited in May, 1958. Our student body increased and with it came a larger teaching staff. This made possible many new classes. Among them were German I, French III, and Shorthand. Some of the new activities included folk dancing, rifle club, photography club, bridge club, pom-pom girls, band, chorus, and pep club.
Our Turkish-American relations took a forward step with Turkish classes available to all students from grades one through twelve. We increased our understanding of this country by exchanging visits with the Turkish schools. This was indeed a year of progress and one that we shall cherish among our memories of Ankara.
As you turn the pages of our book you will meet a bearded fellow. He is Nasredin Hodja, Turkey's best-loved teacher-priest. He had a talent for being very foolish as he did wise things and being very wise as he did foolish things. We have chosen him as one link between the new and the old because his charm lives even today after five centuries.

## Burtonmood :llemories Are Ten \Jears Long

From the windows of Burtonwood American High School we can see not only typical airbase activities but rural, historic, and industrial scenes also. In the distance is an ancient church spire; toward Warrington are factory chimneys; across the fence is a green field; beyond are woods. On the base itself are many beauty spots, several houses of historic interest.

June, 1959, marks the end of the tenth year of school for boys and girls here, the ninth for senior high school pupils. At least one of us recalls September, 1949, when one building housed elementary classes in the only Air Force school in Area I at that time. Many more recall recent years when classrooms bulged and our over-all enrollment exceeded eight hundred.

During this decade more than ten thousand elementary and high school pupils have attended here; forty-six seniors have already graduated.

Many of us remember the scattered olive-green buildings where we attended until September, 1957. This year one hundred forty-seven of us, grades seven through twelve, began lessons with thirteen teachers for a second year in our new school with its salmon pink halls, black wrought iron staircase, - and new lockers.

Against a background of familiar Burtonwood scenes we present our administrators, teachers, and classmates and show our classrooms and activities from September, 1958, until June, 1959, in our section of Vapor Trails.

Prior to the summer of 1942, the Bushy Park Air Force Base area was the Royal Deer Park of the Hampton Court Palace. At this time, the Eighth Air Force, a unit of the Army Air Forces, set up its Headquarters in what is now referred to as "A" Block. By August, the Eighth Air Force Service Command, a sub-unit of the Eighth Air Force, was installed in the newly completed "B" Block, which is now the High School building. "C" and "D" Blocks, present day Elementary School and dormitory areas, were finished one year later.

In January, 1944, General Dwight D. Eisenhower was designated Supreme Commander of the Allied Expeditionary Forces, and established his Headquarters at Bushy Park. This organization, known as SHAEF, occupied "C" and "D" Blocks, and certain outlying buildings, some of which have now disappeared. The Eighth Air Force organizations previously mentioned were redesignated as Headquarters United States Strategic Air Force in Europe, and Headquarters of the Air Service Command, respectively. Shortly after D-Day, in June 1944, all these Headquarters moved to France.

Bushy took on the aspect of a miniature Grand Central Station. Among the group of VIPs were such famous people as Churchill, George VI, Field Marshal Lord Montgomery, General Spaatz, General Patton, Lord Tedder, General De Gaulle, and many others.

Formerly a little group of seven "dallas huts" in a far corner of the base, the high school is now well-equipped and well situated - a sharp contrast to its humble beginning. This year a new wing containing nine rooms has been added. There are now about 280 students at N.C.B. High. Even the school's name has been changed. On graduation day of 1956 the Nouasseur High School was re-named the Nelson C. Brown High School, in honor of a school officer who was killed in February of 1956.

At Nouasseur we have had a chance to see and observe two different cultures at the same time. The French and Moroccans live and work together, each retaining his own religion and customs. There is an opportunity to promote, in a small way, international relationships. We have done our best to do so during our stay here.

## H. H. Actoold High Sctpool

Perched high on Hainerberg hill, overlooking the picturesque Roman resort city of Wiesbaden, stands our General H. H. Arnold High School. Today, with an enrollment of over six hundred, the school is a far cry from the old green-stone building on Lahnstrasse, home of the original forty-eight Warriors.
But Germany has modernized, and with it, General Arnold High. Our modern classrooms, auditorium, and gymnasium are evidence of this fact. Last year, a new AYA building was added next door to us, giving us a fine place for recreation and relaxation. Ninety-nine of our six hundred and eighty students reside in our dormitory, built in 1957. Connected to the dorm is an efficiently run cafeteria, which provides our daily meals.

Upon leaving the main building, one sees our Warrior Stadium, a grassy field where, in the past, excellent teams have romped over their stiff competition. Walking back to the school, one
enters the connecting corridor between the gym and the school. In the gym the Warriors have hosted many fine basketball teams, and, though not always victorious, have maintained a reputation for good sportsmanship.

The high academic standing of our school is due in part to the efforts of the students themselves, but mainly to the excellent faculty and the wellequipped classrooms. The bright, friendly atmosphere of these rooms encourages learning.

This year a new administration brought many new ideas, but still retained several of our oldest traditions, such as the selection of the boy and girl student of the month.

We are fortunate to be students at General H. H. Arnold, since we receive not only a standard high school education, but also have the cultural advantage of being in Europe. Our school has had an excellent past record; signs point to its future being even brighter than its past.
